


CITATION REMINDER WEB SITE CITATIONS

Remember that to cite a Web site you need two things:

- ◆ The name of the WHOLE Web site.
- ◆ The URL.

- ◆ The name of the SPECIFIC page/article.

REMEMBER: NoodleTools asks for the specific page first, THEN the name of the whole site, but the space for the name of the whole site has a star (*) next to it to help you remember that that is the main thing.
